Hampshire's Fire Department was chartered in 1931 after the Great Hampshire Fire of 1929 destroyed a third of the businesses in the village's downtown area. The original staff consisted of a fire chief and 30 volunteer firefighters.

The first firehouse was in the building that is now Village Hall at 234 S. State Street. The current firehouse at 202 Washington Ave. was built in 1962.

The Hampshire Fire Protection District (HFPD) was formed in 1961. In 1974, the HFPD began providing Emergency Medical Services. The first ambulance was a donated hearse. Monument at Seyller Park

The fire district serves a population of around 10,000, in a 42 square mile area in Kane and DeKalb Counties.
It also protects 9 miles of Interstate 90 into McHenry County. The district responded to 1,460 incidents in 2021.

The fire district is currently planning for major growth within the district that will include almost 3,000 new homes and several large commercial developments. When these developments are built out, call volume is projected to increase to approximately 2,700 calls annually.

The district has been updating its apparatus fleet the last two years

DRY CUTTING CONCRETE


Silicosis Kills



KEEP PETS LEASHED

Village of Hampshire Ordinance:

2-11-11: RUNNING AT LARGE; LEASH RE-QUIRED:

A. No owner or any person entitled to the custody of any dog or cat shall permit the dog



or cat to be at large or to confine the dog or cat in a manner so that it can escape and so be at large without his permission, unless the dog or cat is securely confined upon a leash of sufficient strength and accompanied by any able bodied person capable of controlling the actions of the dog or cat under any circumstances.

B. Any dog or cat in an unfenced property and not using an invisible or electronic fence shall be properly restrained on the property a minimum of five feet (5') from any public right of way and property lines. (Ord. 08-35, 9-11-2008)

2-11-12: PENALTY:

Every person who is convicted of a violation of this article shall be guilty of a class B misdemeanor. (1985 Code; amd. Ord. 08-35, 9-11-2008)

UTILITY BILL PAYMENT OPTIONS

Auto Debit - No Fee: apply on the Village website. Assign payment from a checking or savings account.

Drop Box - No fee: located outside Village Hall.

Mail - Stamp: Village of Hampshire, 234 S State St, Hampshire, IL 60140

E-Pay - Processing Fee: online at the Village website using credit or debit cards.

In Person At Village Hall - No Fee for cash or check; Processing Fee for credit or debit cards.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS

Do not blow grass clippings into the street. Doing so blocks storm water from draining into the sewer creating ponding on the roads.

Village Ordinance:

2-15-3: COLLECTION TIME:

A. No garbage or refuse of any kind shall be deposited in any street, alley or public place, at any time, except as provided herein.

B. Containers of garbage or refuse, and any other household trash, refuse, or items to be discarded may be placed on the tree bank or parkway adjoining the public street or alley not more than twenty four (24) hours prior to scheduled collection, and shall be so placed that any contents will not be blown about or scattered by natural elements.

Trash carts must be kept out of the street to facilitate snowplowing and/or street sweeping.

PLANT A POLLINATOR GARDEN

You Can Make A Difference



Pollinators are the engine that run healthy habitats. Whether you have a few feet on your apartment balcony or several acres, you can make a difference. Build your own pollinator garden and help ensure the future is filled with pollinators.

While flowering plants can grow in both shady and sunny locations, consider your audience. Butterflies and other pollinators like to bask in the sun and some of their favorite wildflowers grow best in full or partial sun with some protection from the wind.

Chose varieties of milkweed and wildflowers that are native to your area. Native plants are the ideal choice. They require less maintenance and tend to be heartier. Find a nursery that specializes in native plants - they'll be familiar with plants that are meant to thrive in your part of the country. It's essential to choose plants that have not been treated with pesticides, insecticides or neonicotinoids. You'll also want to focus on selecting perennials to ensure your plants come back each year and don't require a lot of maintenance.

Pollinators need nectar early in the spring, throughout the summer and even into the fall. Choosing plants that bloom at different times will help you create a bright and colorful garden that both you and pollinators will love for months!

Dig holes just big enough for the root system, then cover and reinforce the roots with soil or compost. Add mulch to reduce weed growth.

Wait, watch, water and weed

It may take some time, but you will eventually see butterflies and other pollinators enjoying your garden. Make sure to weed and water your garden to keep it healthy. Keep in mind that it may take a couple seasons for milkweed to start producing flowers.
