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Everything Homeowners Need to Know About Code Enforcement

For most people, investing in a home is the biggest investment they will make. Code violations jeopardize those investments.

Code compliance is good for everyone

- Code enforcement works to keep properties from becoming eyesores in the community.
- Code compliance results in improved property values, improved safety and health and improved quality of life.
- Code compliance improves the overall attractiveness of the community which increases the likelihood of economic development.

The goal is <u>not</u> to increase revenue, but rather to gain compliance

- The focus is on the exterior condition of a property.
- In the fight against public health threats, code compliance is key.
- Things such as old tires lying around create a standing water situation which is a breeding ground for mosquitoes and other pests.
- Code violations result in a courtesy notice.
- Notices that go unanswered result in a ticket being issued.
- Once tickets are issued, fines and/or a court appearance follows.

80% of notices result in the cooperation of the property owner making the necessary correction.

- Debris and overgrown weeds create harborage for rodents and other small animals.

FACADE IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

Downtown Hampshire will be getting a new look. The Business Development Commission recommended, and the Village Board approved, the following facade improvement grants. Watch for facade improvements at 129, 137, 141, 165 and 278 State St., and at 148 Washington Ave.

RT72/STATE ST CONSTRUCTION

The reconstruction of IL72/State St intersection is scheduled to begin in October.

This is the result of 5 years of coordination between the Village of Hampshire and the Illinois Department of Transportation.

The intersection will remain open to traffic, however, truck traffic will be detoured. The goal of this project is to create proper drainage to avoid flooding, and to promote safety with new crosswalks and lighting.

The project is expected to take two months to complete.

BUILDING IS BOOMING

New home construction is progressing well in the subdivisions around town. Hampshire is growing at a very good pace. One of the major projects is in the Oakstead Community subdivision on Big Timber Road.

You've likely seen the beautiful large retention pond that has been built there. South of the pond you'll see the new elementary school being built. The school will accommodate 1,000 students.

District 300 expects the school to be open for the 2022 - 2023 school year.

With all the new homes being built there will be many more young families with children who will no doubt be attending the new school.



HOW MANY STREET LIGHTS IN HAMPSHIRE?

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PUBLIC WORKS ALERT

Only Rain Down the Drain

Hampshire Municipal Code (§9-1-3) prohibits dumping or discharge into the stormwater system and makes it illegal for anyone to place debris into the streets or onto the sidewalks.

Yard debris like grass clippings, shrubbery trimmings and leaves are a significant source of stormwater pollution. Water from the stormwater system is discharged directly into Hampshire and Coon Creeks.

The stormwater system is designed to carry storm water only! Other debris can cause clogs in the culverts, storm drains and piping which causes flooding, and debris that reaches the creeks and negatively affects the fish in the creeks as well as the plant life on the banks. Our storm sewer drains are vital to our homes and businesses because they carry water away. Even a single blockage could cause unwanted issues, but a seriously blocked system could force water back out, flooding the surrounding area and streets.

The long-term effect, and the main issue with fall foliage in a storm sewer system, is that leaf litter adds phosphorous and nitrogen into the water. In excess these nutrients cause what is know as eutrophication which is an excessive richness of nutrients in a lake or other body of water which causes a dense growth of plant life, and death of animal life from lack of oxygen.
