BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

Hampshire kids went back to school Tuesday, August 13th. It is time for us to be more alert. It is time to protect the safety of our students. Here are some safety tips for motorists to be cognizant of when driving:

1. Plan ahead and leave home earlier than normal to allow enough time to reach your destination.

2. Always come to a complete stop at stop signs and be sure to check carefully for children on sidewalks or at crosswalks before proceeding, and obey directions of crossing guards.

3. Obey school zone speed limits. Slowdown in school zones and reduce speed to 20 mph, and be extra alert for children walking, and children on bicycles. Make eye contact with children who are crossing the street.

4. Be cautious when approaching a school bus. It is illegal to proceed around or past a school bus when the stop sign is engaged. Be extra alert for students crossing the street after getting off a bus. Never pass a school bus loading or unloading children. The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them to safely enter and exit the bus.

5. Eliminate distractions while driving. Stay alert. Illinois bans the use of all handheld devices while driving.

6. Follow street signage for traffic control and parking restrictions on streets near and around the school.

By following these tips we can help our students get to and from school safely each and every day!

TRAFFIC SAFETY

Northeastern Illinois is experiencing a traffic safety crisis. Traffic fatalities, particularly among pedestrians and bicyclists, have been increasing since 2014, and speed has contributed to 35 to 40 percent of fatal crashes in Illinois.

Why is this happening? The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning's new Speed Management report explores the role of speeding in increased deaths and serious injuries on our region's roads. It provides recommendations for street designs, speed limit policies, education, and equitable enforcement that can help keep all road users safe.

So now what? Safer streets can start with you. Understand the risks, slow down, share the road, and pass these messages along to your community. Join our region in making travel safe for everyone.

Did you know that there is a 45 percent likelihood of a pedestrian dying when hit by a car at 30 mph compared to just a 5 percent likelihood at 20 mph? Or that today's modern vehicles are significantly larger and heavier than in previous decades, meaning they are more dangerous to pedestrians and bicyclists in a collision?

These are just a couple findings from the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning's new Speed Management report, which explores how speed has contributed to the alarming rise in traffic fatalities in northeastern Illinois over the past decade. Slowing down is critical to improving traffic safety in our region. The report provides recommendations for street designs, speed limit policies, education, and equita-



ble enforcement that can help keep all road users safe. Safer streets also start with YOU. We encourage you to understand the risks of speeding. Slow down. Share the road.

Drivers must yield the right-of-way to a bicyclist just as they would to any other vehicle.

When passing a bicyclist, motorists must do so slowly and leave at least three feet of passing space. Crowding or threatening a bicyclist is prohibited. A motorist should not park or drive in marked bicycle lanes.

WINTER PARKING/YARD WASTE

Residents are reminded that the Village Winter Parking Ban goes into effect on November 1st and lasts until April 1st. Parking on the street is prohibited from 1 am to 6 am. Additionally, vehicles cannot be parked on streets or alleys for a period of 24 hours following the accumulation of 2" or more of snow.

By not parking on streets after a snowfall it allows the Village to plow the entire street effectively and efficiently. Vehicles parked on the street during the ban will be towed at the owner's expense.

The last day for yard waste collection is December 15th.

All yard waste must be placed in brown bags or 35-gallon plastic/metal cans and placed at the curb with your garbage and recycling carts to be picked up by Flood Brothers. Twigs and branches should be bundled and tied with twine or similar material.

Yard waste should not be blown into or deposited into the streets as it can get into the storm sewer system and cause clogging and back-up during rain showers.

Residents are reminded that yard waste burning is not permitted. Brush (tree limbs, branches, and twigs) are permitted to be burned between the hours of 10 am - 3 pm, but not when winds exceed 10 mph.

ONLY RAIN DOWN THE DRAIN

Proper yard waste disposal isn't just a good idea, it's the law.

Hampshire Municipal Code (§9-1-3) prohibits dumping or discharge into the stormwater system and makes it illegal for anyone to place debris into the streets or onto the sidewalks.

Yard debris like grass clippings, shrubbery trimmings and leaves are a significant source of stormwater pollution. Water from the stormwater system is discharged directly into Hampshire and Coon Creeks.

The stormwater system is designed to carry storm water only! Other debris can cause clogs in the culverts, storm drains and piping which causes flooding, and debris that reaches the creeks and negatively affects the fish in the creeks as well as the plant life on the banks. Our storm sewer drains are vital to our homes and businesses because they carry water away. Even a single blockage could cause unwanted issues, but a seriously blocked system could force water back out, flooding the surrounding area and streets.

The long-term effect, and the main issue with fall foliage in a storm sewer system, is that leaf litter adds phosphorous and nitrogen into the water. In excess these nutrients cause what is know as eutrophication which is an excessive richness of nutrients in a lake or other body of water which causes a dense growth of plant life, and death of animal life from lack of oxygen.

PUMPKIN SMASH

The Village will be hosting a Pumpkin Smash composting drive on Saturday, November 9th, from 9 am to 12 pm at Henpeck Park. Stop over and see your pumpkin get smashed!



Did you know that pumpkins are over 90% water and produce nutrient-dense soil feed, including nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. By smashing your pumpkins, you will be diverting them from landfills where the pumpkins go to waste.

Pumpkins should be free of any decoration before being brought

to the event. Thank you to our sponsors: Flood Brothers for providing the dumpster and hauling service, and to our community partners SCARCE, Kane County Illinois Scrap and Composting Coalition and Go Green Illinois.


