Let me share some facts and trivia about Independence Day:

The Declaration of Independence was originally named, "A Declaration by the Representatives of the United States in General Congress Assembled."

Not only was the name different, but the actual date the Continental Congress voted to declare independence from Great Britain was July 2, not July 4.




However, it took two more days to have it written down on paper for delegates to sign. From that day forward, July 4

would commemorate the birth of America's Independence.

Interestingly, John Adams, a Continental Congress Delegate and future president, argued July 2 should remain the true birth date of Independence and refused to attend any Fourth of July event.



In a strange coincidence, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, the two men most associated with



the Declaration of Independence, died only a few hours apart on July 4 in 1826, the 50th anniversary of the country they helped found.

Benjamin Franklin's signature on the Declaration caused an irreversible split with his son William, who at the time was the British appointed governor of New Jersey. This split demonstrates how divided the fledgling country was over seeking Independence.

The Pennsylvania Evening Post was the first newspaper to print the Declaration on July 6, 1776.

The first public reading of the Declaration took place on July 8, 1776, in Philadelphia.

On July 4, 1778, George Washington ordered a double ration of rum for his soldiers to celebrate the holiday.

A fictional story written in the 1840's suggests that the Liberty Bell was rung the day of the signing, but historians doubt the accuracy of this tale, since the steeple that housed the famous bell was in such poor condition.

July 4 wasn't declared a national holiday until 1870, and didn't become a paid holiday until 1941.

Fireworks were not a July 4th staple until after 1816, when Americans began producing their own pyrotechnics.

Fourth of July celebrations only became important after the War of 1812, and it wasn't until the late the early 1900's that the Fourth of July became more of a family celebration, and not just a day centered around political party rallies.

When the Declaration was signed, the country had 2.5 million residents. In fact, the population was so small that seven of the Declaration signers were married to their cousins.

However, one fact remains indisputable, the Declaration of Independence, even after 242 years, still serves as a shining example to people everywhere to rise up against tyranny wherever and whenever it exists.

Other countries, including Denmark, England, Norway, Portugal and Sweden also celebrate the Fourth of July as a way to bring in American tourists.

Recently, Hampshire residents received notice that ComEd was switching to Smart Meters. Some residents have expressed concern about potential health risks associated with smart meters, including the effects of radio frequencies emitted from these meters. Although smart meters use radio technology, under typical circumstances a person would receive less radio frequency exposure from a smart meter than from many other electronic devices

that are used daily, including cordless phones, cell phones, microwave ovens, wireless computer networks (Wi-Fi) and even baby monitors.



I have scheduled our ComEd Representative to speak briefly about these smart meters at our Village Board Meeting on July 19th. Anyone interested may come and ask questions if they have any concerns.

Estimated Water Bills Explained



Generally water meters are read every 60 days or so, and the Water Department works hard to obtain an accurate reading from your water meter each and every billing period. On occasion, however, there may be an issue with the MXU (for remote reading) or the meter and we are

not able to obtain an actual reading.

When that happens we will estimate usage. If a customer's water consumption is estimated, "ESTIMATE" will appear on the right-hand side of the bill as shown above. If you received an estimated bill, we are asking you to contact Village Hall at 847-683-2181, extension 22 to arrange for an appointment to have your meter checked.

Village code requires that all premises using water service from the Village water system be equipped with an accurate water meter. If we are required to estimate your bill on a regular basis and we don't hear from you first, we will let you know by door hanger that your water meter equipment is malfunctioning and in violation of village ordinance. Please call us if your current bill shows an estimated read!

Dear Neighbors,

It seems that some homeowners have been discharging their grass clippings into the Village's streets. I've attached 2 pictures to show why we shouldn't do this, and a copy of the Hampshire ordinance that prohibits this practice. Not only does it clog the storm drain, and as a result floods the roadways, but it also collects in our system and eventually into our creeks and rivers.

Any grass clippings generated from an individual's property needs to stay on that property or be disposed of with the normal weekly landscape waste pickup. With each homeowners cooperation we can avoid potential flooding.

Village Ordinance:

"D. Deposits, Deliveries On Sidewalks:

1. It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit, or to permit to be deposited, upon any public way in the village, <u>including any public street</u> or sidewalk, any rubbish, trash, or debris; any mud, dirt, cement, concrete, gravel, stones, plant matter, <u>including grass clippings</u>; any snow from snow removal operations; or any material which may cause damage to said sidewalk or street, which may be a hazard to persons, animals, property or vehicular traffic, or which may <u>impede the flow of storm water</u>.

Dog Days of Summer


