

We take it for granted that it will be there when we need it. The water is there because we have a well maintained water distribution system.

The heart of a water distribution system is the water tower. Water towers must be kept in good repair to ensure that we have a reliable good clean supply.

At the time of this writing, it is expected that the Elm Street elevated water storage tank project will be complete. Jetco, Ltd. was contracted to repair and repaint the water tower.

The paint is not just cosmetic. purpose is to persevere this valuable asset preventing rust and by deterioration. Water towers are extremely costly. Money spent maintaining that asset is money well spent. Cleaning and repainting the water tower is important for preserving the structure and preventing the steel from rusting.

Our water towers are integral parts of

the water distribution system. We need to keep them in top condition, inside and out. The village spent over \$450,000 on this project. Again, we have our Public Works Department employees to thank for keeping clean water flowing to our homes.

I am extremely proud to report that the Loves Truck Stop project, at the 190/US20 intersection, is rolling along.

The project includes an Arby's restaurant, a general store and a semitruck dealership. It is expected that the truck stop and restaurant will be open in December. The village is working on a project to connect this parcel to our water system. It will probably cost over one million dollars to complete this job. Money well spent. The sales tax revenue from the businesses at this location will be a big boost to the village budget for many years to come.

To get a great view of the project take the westbound I90 off ramp. You'll get a good view of the size of this important development.

A Message From Village Clerk Linda Vasquez

Winter Parking Ban goes into effect on November 1st.

NO PARKING-WINTER SEASON:

On all streets in the Village, between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m., each day from November 1st to April 1st.

The **last yard waste pick up** will be on **November 29th.** Yard waste must be placed in brown kraft paper bags or properly identified 32-gallon plastic or metal cans, weighing 50 lbs. or less. Branches must be bundled with natural twine and no longer than 4 feet in length and no heavier than 50 pounds. Bundles are not exceed 2 ft. in diameter. Individual branches are not to exceed 4 inches in diameter.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION NEWS

We are excited about all the activities that are going on in the Business Development Commission. In the past 6 months we have fought for, and won, the approval of a \$100,000 beautification program for the downtown area. We have modified the ordinance defining the Business Development Commission to create a Beautification Committee for downtown that would focus solely on issues involved in the

downtown area. Currently, led by Eileen Fleury, they are working on designing and eventually recommending to our commission a façade program that will jump-start their efforts.

In addition to the work focused on downtown, we have begun work on putting the results from the survey that we issued to good use.

We had over 500



respondents to the two different surveys that made us very pleased. Through that process we have identified over 200 businesses that we will be reaching out to inviting them to join in the renaissance that is just beginning to take place in our village. Our hope by using this process is that the companies that we reach out to will have a proven track record of success in offering high quality goods and services that our residents have already validated.

Finally, we have created a program whereby we will be highlighting businesses that are currently operating in town in an effort to help our residents connect to them and understand what they have to offer and the quality they bring to their business. We have enlisted the help of a professional freelance journalist, Jeanie Mayer, who has agreed to help us write these articles that will be posted on the village website and on Facebook. We are grateful for her service.

As promised, we are working diligently to bring about the change that people in town have stated they so desperately want. Eventually, we aim that you will be able to spend your hard earned dollars locally in high quality businesses that reflect the rural small town values that define our residents. Estimated Water Bills Explained



Generally water meters are read every 60 days or so, and the Water Department works hard to obtain an accurate reading from your water meter each and every billing period. On occasion, however, there may be an issue with the MXU (for remote reading) or the meter and we are not able to obtain an actual reading.

When that happens we will estimate usage. If a customer's water consumption is estimated, "ESTIMATE" will appear on the right-hand side of the bill as shown above. If you received an estimated bill, we are asking you to contact Village Hall at 847-683-2181, extension 22 to arrange for an appointment to have your meter checked.

A Message From The Public Works Department

Dear Neighbors,



Autumn is upon us, and with it comes the array of reds, yellows, oranges and browns of the falling leaves. It's picturesque, postcard stuff as the leaves tumble to the ground and color the landscape. However, there is one potentially detrimental impact these leaves can have on our lives - the blocking of our storm sewer drains.

Our storm sewer drains are vital to our homes and businesses because they carry water away. Even a single blockage could cause unwanted issues, but a seriously blocked system could force water back out, flooding the surrounding area or backing up our sewer system indoors.

The Village of Hampshire does not have a leaf pickup program. Please do not rake leaves into the street. Leaves



must be disposed of along with other landscape waste in recyclable bags put at the curb for Waste Management.

The long-term effect, and the main issue with fall foliage in a stormwater sewer system, is that leaf litter adds phosphorus and nitrogen into the water. In excess, these "nutrients" cause what is known

Village code requires that all premises using water service from the Village water system be equipped with an accurate water meter. If we are required to estimate your bill on a regular basis and we don't hear from you first, we will let you know by door hanger that your water meter equipment is malfunctioning and in violation of village ordinance. Fall Leaf Colors Are Present Year-round

The gorgeous red, orange, and yellow pigments in fall foliage are actually there all year, just under the surface. Sunlight helps fuel plant cells containing chlorophyll, which gives leaves its vivid green color while working to turn light into energy. When sunlight diminishes in fall, chlorophyll breaks down, letting the plant's hidden red, yellow, and orange hues shine.

How do Christmas trees stay green? Thank the needles. Coniferous needles are compact, watertight, and generally harder for weather and insects to destroy. By slowing everything down, pine trees can photosynthesize year-round, keeping the chlorophyll at work and keeping the needles permanently green.

Toilet History and Trivia

It is a common belief that Englishman Thomas Crapper is responsible for the invention of the toilet. However, the flushing toilet was really invented by Queen Elizabeth I's godson, Sir John Harrington, in 1596, but the idea failed to catch on. People continued to use chamber pots or cess pits.

Joseph Bramah of Yorkshire patented the first practical water closet in England in 1778. George Jennings in 1852 also took out a patent for the flush-out toilet.

Train Sopping Distance



The average freight train is about 1 to 11/4 miles in length (90 to 120 rail cars). When it's moving at 55 miles an hour, it can take a mile or more to stop after the locomotive engineer fully applies the emergency brake. An 8-car passenger train moving at 80 miles an hour needs about a mile to stop.

According to the National Safety Council:

- A lightweight passenger car traveling at 55 miles an hour can stop in about 200 feet in an emergency under perfect conditions that is, if tires and brakes are in good condition and the road is dry.
- A commercial van or bus will need about 230 feet to stop.
- A commercial truck/trailer can stop in about 300 feet that's the length of a football field.
- A light rail train requires about 600 feet to stop - the length of two football fields.
- Compared to this, the average freight train we mentioned above traveling

Toilet paper wasn't commercially produced until Northern tissue, in 1935, began to advertise toilet paper that was "splinter free". Prior to that it was common to have splinters in the toilet paper roll (Ouch!) due to the production techniques used at the time.

Toilet Paper Scare

Johnny Carson inadvertently once started a panic in December 1973. He stated during his monologue on The Tonight Show,

Carson said, "You know, we've got all sorts of shortages these days. But have you heard the latest? I'm not kidding. I saw it in the papers. There's a shortage of toilet paper!"

This prompted Americans to go and buy as much toilet paper as they could - causing a shortage for almost a month in the United States. Following several days of shortages of toilet paper, Carson went back on air to try his best to explain it was just a joke and apologized.

He said, "I dont want to be remembered as the man who created a false toilet paper scare. I just picked up the item from the paper and enlarged it somewhat...there is no shortage."

However, the damage had been done, and the supermarkets' shelves were empty.

Carson may have been responsible for causing the panic that created a brief toilet paper shortage, but he was not solely to blame. On 11 December 1973, Harold V. Froelich, a 41-yearold Republican congressman from Wisconsin, put out a press release warning the public about a possible toilet paper shortage:

> "The U.S. may face a serious shortage of toilet paper within a few months... we hope we don't have to ration toilet tissue... a toilet paper shortage is no

In the same way that airplanes can seem to be moving slowly, your eyes can play a trick on you when a train is approaching - an optical illusion that makes a train seem farther away and moving more slowly than it really is. Don't take chances - it's easy to misjudge a train's speed and its distance, especially at night. If you see a train, just wait.

Slippery Rail: Trains Take Longer To Stop

Autumn leaves are a nightmare for locomotive engineers.

Here's the scenario: leaves fall to the ground, and some inevitably land on the train tracks. A train runs over the leaves, and compresses them to the tracks where they stick to the rail due to leaf oils. More leaves fall, or get blown onto the track in the wake of the train, and the process of leaf compression and build up continues. The residue that results is remarkably slippery, and rainy weather adds to the problem.


The surface becomes so slick that trains have to accelerate and decelerate much more slowly than normal in order to avoid slipping, which could cause catastrophic accidents. If the locomotive detects that all wheels are not turning evenly (slippery rails can cause one or more wheels to spin faster than the others) will automatically apply the brakes which has the potential of locking the wheels, only making the problem worse. A locked wheel sliding along a track will create a 'flat spot'.

Commuter trains, with their frequent stops, are affected by this problem much more than freight trains.

At this time of year, when approaching a railroad crossing, be aware that the train may need more time and distance to stop. Observe all crossing gates and lights.

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
